RULES & REGULATIONS

1. No additional or substitute entries will be allowed, unless the Secretary has been notified prior to the show.

All entries MUST be submitted by September 20th.

- 2. All exhibits **MUST** be bonafide the property of the Exhibitor, and with the exception of Livestock and Homecraft, MUST have been grown, produced or made during the current year. Forfeiture of the premiums will follow any infringement of this Rule, and debar the Exhibitor in the future.
- 3. No person shall make more than one entry in the same Section of a Class, unless otherwise stated.
- 4. No animal is allowed to compete for more than one prize unless as herinafter provided, foals, teams, and herds of cattle are exceptions to this rule.
- 5. In case of bad weather or any other detrimental force, the Society reserves the right to reduce the prize money in accordance with the average of the last three normal years of attendance for that day. The requirements for #16 under rules and regulations must also be adhered to be eligible for any payout.
- 6. No animals or articles entered for competition shall necessarily entitle the Owner to a Prize unless it is considered worthy by the Judges.
- Registered Certificates of Pure Bred Horses, Cattle & Sheep must be handed to the Committee in Charge on the day of exhibition, if requested.
- 8. It is strictly forbidden to attach Prize Tickets given at any former Exhibition to any animal or article, until the Judges have made their award.
- 9. Exhibitors of animals, immediately on receiving their Prize Ribbons, shall affix them to the Prize Animals as soon as it is practically possible to do so.
- 10. Entry Tickets shall be supplied for entries and **MUST** be attached to **EVERY** article entered.
- 11. The First, Second and Third prizes shall be distinguished by Red, Blue and White ribbons respectively.
- 12. The Society accepts no responsibility for theft or loss of any Article on the grounds.
- 13. The Society shall not be responsible for any accident on the grounds.
- 14. Any person who interferes with the Judge, or Committee in Charge, or who intimidates or discredits the Judge or Committee, will be expelled from the Show Ring immediately. All Prize Money shall be forfeited, and the offender shall be excluded from exhibiting the following year.
- 15. The Exhibition shall be open at 9:00 a.m. each day.
- NO Livestock may be taken from the grounds before 5:00 p.m. on the day on which they are judged. Exhibits in main buildings MUST NOT BE REMOVED before 4:30 p.m. Monday.
- 17. No premiums will be paid until after October 31st.
- 18. All protests or appeals **MUST** be made in writing and must state plainly the cause or complaint, and shall be presented to the Secretary at or before 6:00 p.m. on the third day of the Exhibition. The sum of twenty dollars shall be deposited with the Secretary in case of protest or appeal, the same to become the property of the Society if the appeal is not sustained.
- 19. Unless otherwise stated in the Class of "Specials" or Championships, only Exhibits in the Regular Classes will be permitted to compete.
- 20. The Society reserves the right to prohibit and prevent all kinds of theatrical, circuses and acrobatic performances, exhibition or shows, and also to regulate or even prevent trafficking, or huckstering in fruit, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition grounds, or within 300 metres thereof; and any

person who, after due notice of such rules and regulations violates the same, shall be liable to be removed by the Officers, police or constables of the Society, and be liable of a fine of not less than \$1.00 or more than \$20.00. Such fines to be enforced and collected as fines are usually collected and to be paid over to the Society for its use and benefit.

- 21. All space for Livestock Exhibits will be available on a "first come, first served" basis.
- 22. All exhibitors must carry personal liability insurance and must be able to provide proof of same if requested to do so.

- Light/Heavy Horse Pulls will follow current Ottawa Valley Horse Pulling Association (OVHDA) Rules, except the following specific rules to Norwood.

RULES SPECIFIC TO NORWOOD:

- 1. The pulling order will be determined by Norwood Horse Draw committee, prior to the beginning of competition.
- Any teamster who has already tested positive in the current pulling season (2025) will not be eligible to drive, hitch and/or help in the ring in the current pulling season at Norwood Fair.
- 3. Any teamster having tested positive at the 2024 Norwood Fair Pull, will <u>not be eligible</u> to drive, hitch and/or participate in the ring the 2025 Norwood Fair Horse Pull.

LIGHT PONY DRAW (01)

Norwood Fair Antique Tractor Show & Demo Pull operates under "Orono Heritage Tractor Club Antique Tractor Pulling Demonstration Rules (2020)

The following pulling demonstration rules have been developed in the interest of preserving and displaying antique tractors. It is anticipated that all persons participating in pulling demonstration events will accept these rules for this purpose and in the spirit for which they were intended.

GENERAL:

01 Must be of a model/series that was manufactured 1959 or prior 02 History of tractor is to be provided for announcer

03 Tractor to pull in one class only. Class winner may be allowed to move up to the next class and will pull last for

demonstration purposes and will not be able to place.

- 04 First puller of a class, (except in a pull off) has the option to repull. The decision must be made prior to unhooking from the sled and the puller will repull in 3rd position.
- 05 During hookup, tractor must be in neutral and driver's hands and feet must be off controls.
- 06 Hooker/un hooker must stand behind the "apron"
- 07 Track minimum width is 16 feet Going out of bounds will result in being Red Flagged with distance determined at that point.
- 08 Puller must be available prior to pull
- 09 Absolutely no jerking of sled at start of pull.
- 10 Puller has 40 feet to restart. Only one restart preferred.
- 11 Tractors must not exceed a designated maximum speed limit. (currently 4.5 mph but this may change if conditions justify it) The first time the horn blows is a warning and the second time is the end of the pull with distance determined at that point.

DRIVER:

- 01 No association with drugs or alcohol
- 02 No passengers on tractor
- 03 Driver must remain seated during pull
- 04 Driver must be at least 16 years of age. If under 18 years of age, written authorization of parent/guardian required.
- 05 Operator must be in attendance at tractor when it is running.

ANTIQUE TRACTORS NORWOOD FAIR PARADE

- 06 Driver must wear closed toed footwear
- 07 Driver must wear DOT approve helmet (or higher approved and must use the chin strap)

TRACTOR:

- Tractor must be stock (not modified). This includes having the proper and complete front end assemblies and fenders. (if originally equipped with fenders).
- 2. Wheel weights are allowed.
- 3. Suitcase weights are not allowed.
- 4. Strings etc. attached to governor or carburetor are not allowed.
- 5. Torque amplifiers may not be shifted while pulling
 - Tires:
 - a) Loaded tires are allowed
 - b) Maximum tire diameter is 38 inches
 - c) Steel wheels are not allowed
 - d) Duals are not allowed
 - e) Cut tires are not allowed
 - f) The use of radial tires is discouraged as they are not consistent with antique tractors.
- 7. Drawbars:
 - a) All tractors must have a drawbar. If not, the tractor must enter one weight class higher.
 - b) Must be ridged in all directions
 - c) Maximum height is 20 inches
 - d) Maximum height is 20 inches for tractors in the 7600 and 9000 lb class.
 - e) Minimum length is 30 inches measured horizontally from the center of the rear wheel to the point of hook.
 - f) Minimum inside diameter of the drawbar hook is 3 inches.

Tractors will pull in the following weight classes;

- 1. 2700 lbs with rims 28" or smaller
- 2. 3500 lbs with rims 28" or smaller
- 3. 4000 lbs
- 4. 4500 lbs
- 5. 5500 lbs
- 6. 6500 lbs
- 7. 7600 lbs
- 8. 9000 lbs

The Executioner Sled Team will no longer supply hitches for any class. It will be up to the puller to have a hitch. <u>"NO HITCH NO PULL"</u>

New this season: As the sled hook has changed, all hitch holes must be a minimum of 3.75 inches long and 3 inches wide.
